More On Parking Woes

Dear Editor and fellow Shareholders, I have been buoyed by the positive response to my recent letter regarding a Resident Only parking petition. Mike Schramm's editorial last week was a welcome acknowledgment of the parking problem and that it is only growing. It also reinforces Resident Parking Areas as a viable solution. I would like to clear up a couple of questions and build upon what he said.

As with any parking plan for a community or business with limited parking space a priority tier is established.

Parking for everyone who wants to park is not the goal. The first tier is the actual Shareholder. We would start with one pass per shareholder and work from there depending on the location. There are actually enough parking spaces available to do that. A Resident Only Lot would be for Shareholders.

I don't like to put the cart before the horse and go down the rabbit hole of too many details, in a plan. I have found that it just leads to a debate that stops the process. The goal of this Petition is to give our Board and Community leaders the mandate to follow through and study and implement a Resident Only system, prioritizing the Shareholders.

Mike's other suggestions about more sand parking, and developing other areas and putting up as many signs as needed to create a safe situation are all common sense ideas that are long overdue.

- teach our children and adults how to swim and dive.

One hundred & eleven years ago today on June 28,1914 a wrong turn changed the course of history. Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and his wife Sophie were shot to death by a Bosnian Serb nationalist during an official visit to the Bosnian capital of Sarajevo and World War I started.

Part of Serbia had been annexed by Bosnia a few years earlier much to the chagrin of the majority of Serbs.







So, when the Archduke and his wife conducted an official visit to Sarajevo the local towns people showed up in force. There was bunting, bands, beer and also six annoyed Serbs who planned on assassinating them. As the party pulled onto Appel Quay, a wide road along the river, heading for the celebration in the main square one of the assassins hurled a short-fuse bomb into the open touring car. The Archduke picked up the bomb and flung it over his shoulder. It exploded in the street and injured several bystanders. Four of assassins took this as a bad omen, ditched their guns and took off.

After checking on the victims the Archduke proceeded to the ceremony. During the speeches, the mayor assured a now very anxious Archduke, "It is over! Surely we have only one murderer in Sarajevo." Nevertheless, the police changed the departure route as a safety precaution and decided to send them back the way they came in. However, the security guys forgot to tell the guy in the lead car. He turned onto the main drag and the Archduke's car followed him. Irate police halted the parade and ordered the Archduke's car to back up into the intersection. More amazed than the police, was a nineteen year-old guy named Gavrilo Princip who as one of the six assassins.

As the cops tried to unravel the gridlock, they let Princip through. He promptly shot and killed the Archduke and his wife Sophie. The killings sparked a chain of events that led to the outbreak of World War I in less than a month. Austria-Hungary blamed the Serbian government while Russia supported the

Serbs, then Austria sought support from Germany against Russia and its allies who included France & Great Britian. On July 28, Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia, and the fragile peace between Europe's great powers collapsed, beginning the devastating conflict now known as the First World War. After more than four years of bloodshed, the Great War ended on November 11, 1918, after Germany, the last of the Central Powers, surrendered to the Allies.

At the peace conference in Paris in 1919, Allied leaders would state their desire to build a post-war world that was safe from future wars of such enormous scale. The Versailles Treaty, signed on June 28, 1919, five years to the day after the Archduke's assassination, tragically failed to achieve this objective. U.S. President Woodrow Wilson's grand dreams of an international peace-keeping organization faltered when put into practice as the League of Nations. Even worse, the harsh terms imposed on Germany, the war's biggest loser, led to widespread resentment of the treaty and its authors in that country — a resentment that would culminate in the outbreak of the Second World War two decades later.

We all want to wish a very Happy Birthday to our senior man, Tony Romano whose celebrates 99th birthday tomorrow. Tony is a US Navy World War II Veteran who served along with his twin brother and his two other brothers during the war. The Post was able to celebrate his birthday at our last meeting. Best wishes to a good man, a true American patriot and a great friend.

My favorite dining perch is at my Formica kitchen counter top, the very same location where I slice vegetables for salad, cut different vegetables to serve hot and prepare soup veggies and baking ingredients for delicious cookies and cakes. As for fruits, I cut cantaloupes and pineapples into bite-size pieces, clean strawberries and blueberries, cut up Kiwis and mangos and prep and milk coconuts. The sign on my refrig says "Joan's Laboratory;" and that's not far from wrong.

Since POTUS Trump began talking about tariffs, he got me wondering where my favorite foods had their origin. Yes, this may surprise you; but, an awful lot of the foods we consume comes from thousands of miles away and are subject to tariffs raising their prices.

My daily diet tariff exposure begins with breakfasts which are the same every day and have been for years. One small orange quartered (Florida), egg salad consisting of hard boiled eggs (New Jersey) carrots (Maryland), red onions (NYS) and scallions (California and Florida) into which I mash a whole sardine (Morocco). My coffee comes from Columbia and Jamaica. A Choice of a bit of fresh pineapple (Costa Rica) and perhaps a few grapes (California), strawberries (New Jersey) and Blueberries (Jersey), kiwis (New Zealand) is fun topped off by a small cracker (NYS) topped with peanut butter (Georgia) which ends my first meal of the day.

Never a lunch eater, my next meal, dinner begins with a monster salad consisting of red cabbage (found around the Mediterranean Coast from either Germany, France, Poland, Austria, or the Netherlands), carrots (Maryland), walnuts (California), Craisins (USA, Canada, Chile), Vidalia onion (Georgia), peppers (Canada), mushrooms (Eurasia and North America), radishes (Western Asia, Mediterranean regions), avocados (Columbia), tomatoes (Florida), beets (California, Colorado, Idaho, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, Washington, and Wyoming).

Cooked vegetables are normally a combination of carrots (Mexico, Canada), broccoli (Mexico), cauliflower (Eastern NYS), fresh corn (New Jersey), string beans (China, NYS), Brussel's sprouts (NYS and California), Asparagus (California, France), Zucchini (Mexico).

For protein as entrees, on any given day there might be Salmon (Norway, Chile, USA), Chicken (Nebraska), Beef (California) and Pork (Illinois) with most meals highlighting chicken and salmon.

Our two closest trading partners, Canada and Mexico have much to do with our consumption of fresh vegetables and fruit. Among Mexico's exports to the US are tomatoes, avocados, raspberries, bell peppers, strawberries, cucumbers, squash, and snap beans. Isn't it rather odd that in the 1960's when Americans traveled to Mexico, we

were warned not to eat many of the items listed that they now export to us. The rationale behind this was they used human waste to fertilize their fruits and vegetables. One would expect they are applying more sanitary fertilizer in their growing of their consumable exports today.

Canada sends us potatoes, cranberries, blueberries, strawberries, blackberries, black raspberries, saskatoons, labrusca grapes, rhubarb, canola, wheat, and soy beans. The US imports beef, fish and seafood from Canada. In fact, 80% of all fish consumed in America comes from Canada. Over half of Canada's agri-food imports originate in the U.S., while 60% of Canada's agri-food exports head south. Additionally, the US imports seafood from China, Chile, India, Indonesia, and Vietnam. We import beef from Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and Mexico. Lamb imports are largely from Australia and New Zealand. Pork imports are sourced from Canada, Mexico, Denmark, Brazil, and Spain. The question arises why we need to import so much meat when we have so many (over 94 million) cows in this country.

It is not surprising that the hamburger obsession our countrymen and women have is the response to filling our import needs.

Aside from Mexico and Canada, other countries that supply us with consumables include the European Union (particularly countries like France and Italy, Brazil, China, and in South America Colombia and Peru; and in Asia Thailand, Singapore and China. China exports mostly non-edibles but does export shrimp, fruits, nuts, peel of citrus fruits, melons and beverages. Italy exports spirits, vinegar, cocoa, cereal, honey, dairy products, eggs, olive oil, pasta, cheese, processed meats, baked goods, coffee, mineral water, and gelato. From France, we import wines, cheeses (like Roquefort), champagne, and various packaged goods.

Believe it or not, over a hundred countries export food to the USA. Wow! Even Turkey, not exactly a country with a leader we admire, exports fresh produce including cherries, apricots, grapes, tomatoes, cucumbers, and peppers; as well as dried apricots, raisins and figs.

Iran, (this is a guess) 'used to' export these foods to America: fresh and dried fruits, nuts, animal hides, processed foods, caviar and spices. The country we just neutered nuclear-wise is the world's largest exporter of pistachio nuts, raisins, dates and saffron. Those Americans who cannot live without pistachios might have to cross our southern or northern border to lay in their supply.

It is with great sadness that we, the USA, felt compelled to bomb Iran's nuclear sites in a desire for instant gratification to resolve a tenuous problem. In 2018 when we were in negotiations to rein in Iran's nuclear capacity, then President Trump walked out on the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), also known as the Iran nuclear deal or the Iran Deal, after the JCPOA was agreed to by Iran and the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council — China, France, Russia, the United Kingdom and the United States — as well as Germany and the European Union. Iran was not very compliant with site inspections; but, those who signed on felt talking was better than fighting. Israel, fearful of Iran's nuclear membership, has been progressively destroying parts of Iran's nuclear program until last week when America carried out Netanyahu's wish to cancel Iran's membership to the nuclear club for good. Will Israel, in much closer proximity to Iran than America, pay heavily for this aggressive action? Will we? Tariffs are one thing, bombings are another.

Our Rockaway Point News is celebrating its 100th Anniversary of publication this year and how better to begin than with one of the first covers of its first issues. The RPN cover of 1915 "The Mardi Gras Souvenir" is being included with this article however it wasn't until 1925 that the RPN was published regularly each week during the summer. I'm including the background within those years between the early years and the cover of The August 30, 1929 issue of the Rockaway Point News which is when Mike Liana assumed the printing responsibility.

Here's a story of what it was like to experience these years as we look to coverage of events behind the publications during those times. According to Long Island Life (April 1921) "Of similar interest to Rockaway Point and in some respects more unique and picaresque are many of the many islands in Jamaica Bay. The question 'when is an island is not an island' might apply to some of these islands, for at times they are lost to sight beneath the water. Nevertheless, on some of these islands people dwell in summer. A second fact of life in

1921 was that the City of New York tried to claim title to Rockaway Point from the then owner, The Southern Pacific Railway by claiming that our land was originally a part of the submerged portion of Barren Island." The Journal American, January 14, 1921 states "The City through Corporation Counsel John O'Brien, has brought an ejectment suit against the railroad interests to recover The Rockaway Point Land, which includes 3,000 bungalow sites from which the railroad subsidiary has been deriving a heavy income. The Southern Pacific, a Harriman line, bases its claim to the Point on the contention that it was added on to property acquired by them some 20 years ago by accretions from the sea. The maps, some of them extending back two hundred years and more offered by the City disprove that indicating that the Point and several miles of The Rockaway Coast were originally part of the present Barren Island. The City's title to Barren Island was acquired through consolidation with the old town of Flatlands." Geological data today verifies the Southern Pacific's claim, and we will discuss our community's growth by accretion because

of our rock jetty construction (1931-1933) when we tour our Pointer's covers from the decade of the 1930's.

I return to that article from "Long Island Life April 1921 which combines a theory of buried treasure on these islands." Nearly every island in Jamaica Bay that is big enough to inhabit has at one time or another been supposed to be the identical spot selected by the resourceful and eminently notorious Captain Kidd. Hopeful and ambitious persons have at times turned up the sands in the belief that by patiently digging they would unearth an oaken chest of

miscellaneous packages of valuable loot. They based their search on the reality of a ship put ashore on Barren Island with \$57,000 in Mexican silver dollars which the crew buried. In 1830 Barren Island was hit by a storm. The Journal American continues (1/14/21) the ac-

count "Just prior to this storm the crew of the ship Vanguard mutinied, murdered the captain and mate and walking its shores, were astonished to find themselves kicking up silver dollars. The tale of the Vanguard is not a mere matter of tradition and mistaken hope, but it is a fact of non-fiction and did in fact actually occur.

Next week, the dangerous Johnny Cakes who upset the F.D. 6-2 play for first place.





Two Amazing Saints

This Sunday, we celebrate Saints Peter and Paul. These two were not child-hood buddies and both were completely changed upon believing in Jesus. Both had name changes after their encounter with Him.

Simon (later called Peter) was a fisherman with his brother Andrew. The scriptures tell us that fishing was not always fulfilling. As a matter of fact, it was Andrew that introduced Simon to Jesus. It didn't go well. Simon just "pulled in" from a disappointing catch and was in no mood to meet his brother's new friend. Jesus senses his mood and tells him to go out again. Simon is probably thinking, "Who is this guy? He's no fisherman, why should I listen to Him." And guess what!

They catch so many fish, their nets were breaking! Imagine the twinkle in Jesus' eye, knowing what Simon would eventually become. He would witness the healing of his mother-in law, the raising of Jairus' daughter and many others. He was also the only Apostle to walk on water.

This Sunday's Gospel describes Jesus asking His apostles who the people think He is. They mention John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah or one of the prophets. But wait! He looks them right in the eye and says, "But who do you say that I am?" Silence and the sound of crickets. Then Simon blurts out, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus is amazed. "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but My Heavenly Father." And so

I say to you, you are Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven."

Saul (later called Paul) was another central figure that Jesus would commission. However, the timing was all wrong. After Jesus rose from the dead, it was Peter and the apostles who would spread the "Good News" (that our Savior died for us). But No, this did not sit well with the Jewish leaders. Saul, a Pharisee was a fighter. His goal was to protect the Jewish law and tradition. He was present when they stoned our first martyr Stephen (a deacon by the way) to death for his belief in Jesus. He would persecute these "Jesus followers" and weed them out.

Due to his fighting spirit, he set off to Damascus looking for more of these Christians. He believed in being the "strong arm" of the God of Abraham. He was in for the shock of his life. While on his way, he was thrown from his horse and beheld a vision of Jesus saying, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" He was blinded for days. He was eventually cured by a disciple of Jesus and baptized.

Now the strong willed Saul insisted he be called Paul. He then spent his entire life converting the non-Jewish people (Gentiles). He is responsible for spreading the Church throughout Europe and Asia Minor. He would be almost beaten to death and imprisoned more than once for those who failed to convert. He never quit and would just travel to the next town and preach again and again.

Paul wrote many letters (epistles) to these new found church communities to continually encourage them. Most Sundays, the second reading is from one of his letters to the: Corinthians, Philippians, Colossians, Romans, Ephesians etc. In a sense, Paul is responsible for us today being Christian.

Peter and Paul eventually met. They were now on the "same page". In fact, they were both martyred in Rome around 62-64 AD. Paul was probably beheaded and did not fear death. He is quoted for saying, "I have fought the great fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

Peter who three times denied Jesus, was sentenced to be crucified by the Roman Emperor Nero. No longer afraid, he asked to be crucified upside down on the cross. He felt unworthy to be upright as was Jesus.

Saint Peter and Paul, pray for us. Pray for our stamina. Pray for our day to day example to others. Pray that we too can say, "We have fought the great fight, finished the race, and have kept the faith."

Vitamin D and Skin Cancer

is stored for long periods of time mainly in the liver and the fatty tissues. When someone is deprived of sunlight, more than 2 months must pass before half of the vitamin D is depleted from the fat stores. The sufficiency of vitamin D throughout the year depends on how much sunshine a person is exposed to on his or her summer vacation. The summertime synthesized D is released from body fat throughout the winter.

Vitamin D is known as the 'sunshine vitamin', because it is made by the action of sunlight on the skin. The plant-derived sterols found in our skin are converted by ultraviolent sunlight into vitamin D. It's not even a vitamin. Vitamins are defined as an organic substance which must be obtained in small amounts from the diet for growth and health. It is a hormone that is made by our body. It has the rare property of being formed by ultraviolet light rather than an enzyme and should not be thought of as a nutrient. Approximately 90% of the vitamin D that we use is formed within the skin through the action of sunlight. Only 10% comes from diet and/or supplements.

Most of the benefits of sunlight, like vitamin D production, occur within the first 20 minutes of exposure. Even though applying sunscreen will increase the time requirement for exposure, it is almost never the cause of vitamin D deficiency. Living here in the northeast, exposing our face, arms, and hands of a light-skinned person to 5 minutes of sun at noon two or three times a week will cause the body to produce sufficient vitamin D to meet all its needs. This time limit is skin-pigment-dependent. People with darker skin may need more sunlight exposure. During the wintertime, we can rely on our fat stores for our vitamin D. People who

already have sun damaged areas of skin should keep those surfaces protected. It is recommended to expose only undamaged areas to collect the benefits of sunshine.

Like proper food, sunshine is essential for life. People have been warned to stay out of the sun and wear protective clothing and use sunscreens to reduce premature aging of the skin and prevent skin cancers. There is no question that overexposure should be avoided, however, I think we may have gone to the extreme when it comes to the sun avoidance. It seems that those people living closer to the equator who are exposed to more sunlight also eat more plant foods, and those of us living at higher latitudes eat more meat and dairy products. The benefits of sunlight overlap with those of diet and exercise. Unless you go to a gym, it has been shown that more sunshine and exercise with a plant-based diet is extremely beneficial.

I know skin cancer is a concern for many of us, including myself. Most of us baby boomers didn't have or use any form of sunscreen. Skin cancer is the number 1 cause of cancer to date here in the United States. The need for sun precautions these days is because populations have migrated from their natural environments. The epidemic of obesity in people of all skin tones has added to the problem because vitamin D is fat-soluble, and excess body fat will pull vitamin D out of circulation which may contribute to the deficiency. Studies that have been done show that eating too much animal fats in our diet may have contributed to the likelihood of being diagnosed with skin cancer. In a randomized control trial, lowering the skin cancer rate was attributed to eating a low-fat diet.


